

# Vision and Values

## Developing the Vision and Values is critical to program progress because it is:

- ▶ A framework for guiding program development
- ▶ A foundation for how we will evaluate different program alternatives
- ▶ A way to ensure the program reflects the character of the community
- ▶ An approach for identifying design options that could be incorporated into the program

## Who decides? And when?

The community Vision and Values statement is currently in development with the goal to be finalized in May 2021. The program is working with public partner agencies to assess how context might have changed since previous planning efforts, to inform the community Vision and Values for the program. The Vision and Values from previous planning efforts are being used as a basis for this work.

Recommendations from the program's steering and advisory groups, along with input from the public, will help inform these important program elements.
